Course Description

The purpose of WVUe 191B is to provide Student Support Services/TRIO participants with information, tools and resources needed to successfully transition to college. The course will cover a variety of academic components needed to help students achieve success and progress towards completion of a college degree. The course will also help students develop an understanding of the SSS/TRIO Program.

Note: WVUe 191B First Year Seminar- SSS/TRIO is an approved first-year seminar class. In order to graduate, WVU students are required to successfully complete a First Year Seminar course with a passing grade. Per program guidelines, the course is required for all new SSS/TRIO participants who have earned 29 college credit hours or less. WVUe 191B is a GEC 6 Objective course.

Course Requirements and Expectations

WELCOME WEEK ACTIVITIES:

- **2 Residence Hall Floor Meetings**: All students living on campus are required to attend their mandatory Residence Hall Floor Meetings on Friday, August 15 and Sunday, August 17. You will receive proof of attendance at the events which you must turn in to your course instructor in order to receive credit for attendance. (15 pts x 2 meetings= 30 pts)
 - *Note: Students NOT living in the residence halls will be required to attend two (2) events for commuter students during the first week of classes to replace the residence hall floor meetings. Acceptable substitutions can be found at http://welcomeweek.wvu.edu/events or talk to your SSS Counselor for further assistance.
- Academic Department Visit: Students are required to participate in the academic department visits on Saturday, August 15, as part of the First Year Academy. You will receive proof of attendance at the event which you must turn in to your course instructor in order to receive credit for attendance. (25 pts)
- Mountaineer Welcome: You are required to attend the University Welcome on Sunday, August 16 prior to the first week of classes. You will receive proof of attendance at the event which you must turn in to your course instructor in order to receive credit for attendance. (25 pts)
 - Please Note: In order to get credit for the First Year Academy events you attend prior to classes beginning, you need to bring proof of attendance (tickets) to your instructor. In the event that you need the proof of attendance for another class, your course instructor can make a copy for his/her records. If you have any problems, please speak with your instructor.
- First Year Academy SSS/TRIO Event: All new SSS/TRIO Participants are required to attend the SSS Success From the Start Event on Saturday, August 15 from 4:30-5:30 p.m. in the Shenandoah Room of the Mountainlair. (25 pts)

ATTENDANCE:

Class Participation and Attendance: In all university courses, attendance is essential for your success. Attendance and coming to class on time are mandatory. For this course, you will complete an attendance exercise for each class session that is based on your reading and/or materials covered in that specific day's class session. If you are absent from class, you will lose points- the attendance exercises <u>cannot</u> be made up. This is reflected in the grading scale below (25 pts x 14 classes = 350). If you need to miss class for any reason, remember to immediately contact your instructor.

ASSESSMENTS:

- Assessments: You will complete one pre-course assessment at the beginning of the class and one post-assessment at the end. You will earn points for the pre-assessment by simply completing it- we will not deduct points for incorrect answers. The post-assessment will be graded based on the number of correct responses you provide. (170 pts)

 - Overall Course Post-Assessment What Did you Learn- ends Dec 8 @ 11:59 p.m. (350 pts)
- Noel Levitz College Student Inventory: You will be emailed instructions on how to access the inventory and must complete it by August 29 @ 11:59 p.m. (100 pts)

ASSIGNMENTS:

- Readings/CONNECT Practice: You will be required to read all chapters of your text as assigned and complete the practice exercises. (14 chapters x 50 pts per chapter= 700)
- Title IX Online Activity: You will be emailed instructions about how to complete this online module titled "CampusClarity." This is expected to be sent to all WVU-E students during the week of August 24. You will need to submit your printed certificate of completion. (50 pts)
- FOCUS: You will complete this major/career assessment and submit your printed report. (100 pts)
- Academic Completion Plan: You will complete this with your academic advisor using DegreeWorks and your print-out is due by December 8. (250 pts)
- Transit Financial Wellness Course Completion: Students should have been sent an email with directions on how to access this online financial wellness module. You must complete Part 1 by September 7, 2015. If you cannot locate your email, you will find the link to this online course in the lower right hand corner on the main Financial Aid website at financialaid.wvu.edu. You must submit your printed certificate in class. (250 pts)
- Library Assignments #1 and #2- Surviving a Zombie Apocalypse: This will be your common read assignment. (150 pts)
- **Kognito:** This is a wellness-related online module that helps you learn how to help a friend in crisis. You must submit your printed certificate in class. (100 pts)
- Individual Conference with SSS Counselor: You are required to meet with your SSS Counselor to complete your Intake and Individualized Success Plan (ISP). During this meeting, you will also review your financial aid for the year and discuss any other issues you or your counselor identifies for the semester. In order to schedule this meeting, you may contact the SSS Office at 293-6629 and request to make an appointment with your SSS Counselor or you may schedule the meeting in person by visiting the SSS Office located in G-30 Mountainlair. This meeting must take place during the first five weeks (last possible day- September 18th) of the semester in order to receive credit. (150 pts)
- Chapter Quizzes: After you read the assigned chapter(s), complete the practice exercises and attend class to cover the related topics, you are required to complete the chapter quizzes. The quizzes are based on correct responses. (14 quizzes x 100 pts each= 1400)
- In-Class Group Activity: This assignment will allow you to reflect upon your semester experiences including results from your Noel Levitz College Student Inventory and other course materials. You will complete this assignment in class towards the end of the semester (75 pts)
- Homework: You should prepare for class by completing all assignments before coming to class. Homework assignments will be distributed in class and details will be provided. *In the event that you need to miss class and there is an assignment due, you may electronically submit it to your instructor. LATE HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.* (135 pts)

- Required Discussion Sessions: In October and November, you will be required to attend two discussion sessions facilitated by our SSS/TRIO peer mentors. In order to accommodate your class and work schedules, the sessions will be provided over several evenings, so you will have plenty of options from which to choose. Your instructor will provide more details about this in class. (65 points for each session x 2 sessions= 130 points)
- SSS Events: You are required to attend at least three (out of class) SSS events throughout the semester. The list of activities will be reviewed during class as well as at your meeting with your SSS counselor. You must attend the entire event and complete an event summary form to receive credit. If you are having difficulty identifying three programs you will be able to attend due to time conflicts, you MUST notify the instructor in writing by the fifth week of class (by September 18th) so that an alternate plan can be developed. An alternative plan will not be developed after the fifth week of class. (100 pts x 3 events = 300 pts)
- SORTS workshop: You are required to attend at least one SORTS (Students On The Road To Success) academic workshop and complete an event summary form to receive credit. You will receive a list of these in which to choose from during class.(75 pts)
- Diversity Week event: You are required to attend at least one event during WVU's Diversity Week scheduled for the week of September 29 and complete an event summary. (75 pts)
